Saturday, August 19, 2023, 6:00–9:00 PM, FDR Memorial Amphitheatre, Rochdale Avenue (Rt. 571) A community open mic night for our neighborhood artists to express themselves. Open to everyone and anyone to perform, collaborate, jam, or tell a joke or two with fellow Rooseveltians and area neighbors. As a gift to the community from RAP, this first event of the year is free to the public.

Art and Garden Tour

There you will be able to view the New Deal mural in the school's lobby, painted by the local Great Depression-era artist Ben Shahn. Light refreshments and restroom facilities will be available. Follow the signs and you will see the monumental sculpture of Franklin Delano Roosevelt created by renowned sculptor Jonathan Shahn. **ALSO NEW THIS YEAR!** Children's arts and crafts projects will be set up on tables beneath the FDR bust sculpture at the amphitheatre.

Slavery Trail

"Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere" is the motto for our multi-media event. Photos, music, and poems will celebrate how America's slavery trail became its civil rights trail. We'll be telling the story of how suffering yielded overcoming. A narrative of our nine-day drive from Greensboro to Selma, Birmingham to Montgomery to Washington, D.C., visiting the Civil Rights Institute and Birmingham Jail and ending at the National Museum of African American History & Culture. What we learn is that Black history is the history of ALL Americans; as Fannie Lou Hamer said, "Nobody's Free Until Everybody's Free."
